GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

I am proud of what we have achieved in the 2023 season, despite a broad range of challenges.

Our unwavering commitment and tireless efforts to professionalise our organisation have transformed BJRU into a well-structured organisation. The pursuit is more than a transformation, it's a commitment to improve competition structures, accountability, financial stability and governance.

Our key focus remains on the VALUE proposition we provide to our members.

As I reflect in my report, it is with some pride that I also reflect on some tremendous achievements and successes we had achieved against our Key Performance Indicators.

The BJRU has experienced some significant progress and initiatives during the season and is proud to be focused on growing junior rugby.

- 44% increase in girl's rugby participation
- Delivered 6 high quality coaching seminars
- Delivered successful benchmark junior carnivals and Interstate Age Group Championships
- Secured Rugby Australia funding for girl's rugby development programs
- Sport Psychology sessions delivered by Condor Performance Psychology
- Increased playing and participation opportunities for junior players by introducing an Inaugural Regional Development Carnival for Under 10 & 11 age group players.
- Stronger board governance and compliance practices, to ensure greater accountability, management of risk and effective decision-making.

As I reflect on the achievements of BJRU over the past 12 months, I'm filled with a sense of optimism for Junior Club rugby in Brisbane.

COACHING

Our game would not be possible without the support and commitment of our coaches. We have created more coaching seminar opportunities for our coaches to upskill themselves and to increase the number of quality accredited coaches.

We need coaches that are NOT ONLY dedicated but also educated.

The flow on effect of accredited and educated people will increase RETENTION both for the players and coaches, to ensure the confirmed growth of junior rugby.

GIRLS RUGBY

We had a significant increase in girls participation numbers in 2023.

327 girls have participated in the GEMS Series which is 44 % increase in playing numbers compared to 2022.

318 players registered for the skills development sessions, an increase of 61 from 2022.

The BJRU Board has also contributed \$20,000 towards girl's representative teams in 2022 & 2023 in order to fast track girl's rugby participation and programs.

With our skills development programs, GEMS series and representative rugby pathways we have delivered in the XV's format, we received financial support from Rugby Australia to resource some of these programs.

Condor Performance Psychology delivered a Sport Psychology seminar to 90 girls in the Under 14, 16 & 18 age group teams.





Our key priority in 2024 is to construct a competition format in girls rugby that embraces aspiration, alignment, retention of players and volunteers; and consideration to our competitors.

We need to ensure there is an effective synergy between the rugby programs, stakeholders and delivery.

REPRESENTATIVE RUGBY

In 2023 the representative program was designed to build upon the progress we made in 2022.

Our aim was to provide a representative program for our junior players that has meaningful value, whilst being both time and cost effective.

Our representative season was again extensive, with 10 programs delivered.

Girl's representative teams

Girls Under 14, 16 & 18 teams travelled to Victoria to compete in the Victoria Rugby Youth Girls State Championships. All three teams performed very well.

QRU Girls 7's State Championships

The BJRU Under 15 and under 17 girl's teams participated in the QRU Junior State Championships.

Both teams performed well with the Under 17 team winning the tournament for the second year.

Under 18 Junior Colts

With the conclusion of the Lightning Series, the Dream Team was selected who played against the Reds Possibles and Reds Probables in a three-way game.

Under 16 Boys

The Under 16 team travelled to New South Wales to compete in the NSWJRU Regional Championships, by far the strongest opposition our Under 16's could play against.

The tournament was played at Grantham Reserve and the Under 16 team were very competitive and played a good brand of rugby.

Under 13 & 14 Boys

The Under 13 boys competed in the SCSC Interstate Cup with the following teams participating:

Victoria, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast, Far North (NSW) and BJRU.

The Under 14 boys competed in the Gilbert Interstate Cup with teams from Victoria, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and BJRU participating.

Both BJRU under 13 & 14 teams were successful at the tournament.

The Under 12 Vending First Challenge Cup had huge interest with teams participating including Victoria Rugby, Far North NSW, Darling Downs, GCDRU, Sunshine Coast, BJRU Red and Blue.

The representative teams allow the opportunity for those advanced players in the BJRU competition to compete at a higher level than the club competition by playing in Championships against teams from Interstate, touring to other competitions and allowing the rugby experience to grow and develop young individuals.

These experiences are a great opportunity for all players to experience the true nature of rugby as a community sport, accepting and building networks.

The BJRU will conduct a thorough review in the off season on its Representative program and as always look to improve our offering for our junior players.

As always feedback and constructive criticism is always welcome - but more importantly get involved and **STAY POSITIVE**.

FINANCE

The Australian sporting landscape continues to be a challenging environment, with extensive challenges, crowded sporting market and tightening of corporate sporting sponsorship opportunities.

We continue to expand our corporate partnerships, despite a difficult market, which is testament of the strength of our product and competition.

BJRU continues to operate in a conservative manner, ensuring that financial decisions made are consistent with the ongoing stewardship of junior rugby in Brisbane.

A broad focus will be put on our fiscal responsibility and cost management across the organisation to ensure our operating expenses are well below the budget.

Our long-term goal is to develop strategies to be commercially viable and to build financial stability for the future of BJRU.

Continuous focus on Governance

There continues to be a focus on improving governance standards within the BJRU to ensure we are **COMPLIANT** to the highest level in as many areas as possible – this is an ongoing long-term strategy.

FUTURE CHALLENGES

While 2023 saw great success across our junior rugby teams and programs, we are also aware of some big challenges facing our sport.

- Match Official Abuse (12 cases in 2022 and 26 cases in 2023)
- Financial stability
- High volume of Incident reports
- High volume Judiciary cases
- Retention of players
- Volunteer burnout and discontent
- Competition with rival codes
- Compliance monitoring

These challenges provide us collectively with an opportunity to focus, recalibrate and work towards continued improvement in achieving better outcomes for the game as a whole.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our 2023 season planning session focussed on our core responsibilities and executing on our strategic vision in line with the plan developed for the 2022-2025 period. Key features included;

- Developing an environment for safe rugby and a high standard for member/supporter enjoyment.
- Continue to develop and improve the quality of playing, coaching, and administration within the Brisbane Rugby Union community.
- Expand our reach to provide better, more competitive, more diverse competitions, satisfying the needs of ALL our members within the Brisbane Junior Rugby Union competition.
- To operate as an efficiently managed, not-for-profit organisation that delivers value to its members and the wider community.
- To increase financial resources, underwriting the growth and sustainability into the future.

We worked very hard, and in some cases championing the cause, around representative and development of rugby due to the disappointments of previous years. Collaborating with our Country partners, interstate friends, and local clubs to roll out representative and development programs across boys, girls, and volunteers. There were some false starts and some disappointments, but we managed to realise ten key events.

- U12 Simon Abubakar Carnival 184 BJRU participants
- Vending 1st Challenge Cup 160 players, including BJRU, Vic, S'Shine, GC, Far Nth NSW and Darling Downs.
- Inaugural SCSC Cup (U13's) 115 players, including BJRU, Vic, S'Shine, GC, and Far Nth NSW
- Inaugural Gilbert Cup (U14's) 115 players. including BJRU, Vic, S'Shine C, Gold C, and Far Nth NSW
- Girls participating in the Victorian Youth Girls State Cup 60 players with U14, U16 and U18 teams attending.
- U16 boys participating in the NSW Regional Championship 23 players.
- City Vs Country games for U13 and U14 boys and U16 and U18 Girls 92 BJRU participants
- The Girls Sevens State Champs at Ballymore in September. 24 BJRU participants
- Inaugural U10 development carnival 220 BJRU participants
- Inaugural U11 development carnival 190 BJRU participants
- 5 Specialty Coaching clinics with more than 100 coaches attending throughout the season.

We attained outstanding successes across most of these events for the BJRU. Our success is not only measured by the results of games but the support of volunteer coaches, managers, and trainers. Exposure to various formats of our game and interacting at the next level, through representative programs, has subjected more than 100 volunteers through the year to a new experience. All the skills and knowledge will filter their way back through to your clubs.

Amongst the competition challenges, we continued to enhance our operations across all areas and improve the competitions we supported. We were focused on engaging effectively with our members, working on our relationships across the Rugby spectrum, and actively managing our financial sustainability and planning.

Sponsorship has reached its highest point in the history of our competition with over \$50,000 of additional funding supporting our programs. A big thank you to VISY, Vending 1st, Gilbert and SCSC for their support this year. We hope to continue our great partnerships ensuring we can continue to develop the game in our region.

Junior rugby continues to experience many challenges; this year was no exception. As owners of the junior game in Brisbane, we all need to do better. At our 1st 2023 Presidents meeting, we spoke about some challenges facing junior sports, particularly around on-field and sideline behaviours. As a Board, we remained committed to providing a safe and welcoming environment for players, officials, team management, and spectators reinforcing poor behaviour and a lack of respect having no place in rugby.

Unfortunately, the 2023 season realized a historical peak of Code of Conduct breaches, with a couple of clubs/teams nearing suspension status. We will continue to be very active in this space as we roll into 2024. Our number one priority is to ensure all our stakeholders are afforded a safe environment to enjoy the game we all love.

To all the Club Presidents and committees, thank you for contributing and assisting this year. To all outgoing club presidents, committee members, and volunteers, thank you for your efforts, and on behalf of the BRJU board, we wish you all the best. Your friendships, commitment to your roles, and rugby, in general, is applauded.

As always, our season is supported by many remarkable people. With the many volunteers who take time to coach, manage teams, and run our clubs, we are forever grateful that you raise your hand and get involved in our game. Without these legends, at the club level, we would not have the great competition we all enjoy.

Thank you to all our special event host clubs. The extensive list of clubs backing the various events this year demonstrates how the Brisbane Junior Rugby cohort works together to support and grow our game.

Thank you to Simon Moore and his team of officials at the QRRA. Gaven, Connor, and the team at the QRU thank you for your ongoing support. To our patron Lawrence McGregor-Lowndes, BJRU life members, Ravin, Lindie, Lisa, the Girls Sub-committee, and my fellow Board members, thank you for your support, guidance, and patience throughout the year. You have had to wear many hats as we worked through the challenges of season '23. I know we will continue to work collaboratively, enhancing further Junior rugby in Brisbane and the wider Southeast Queensland region.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As we approach the end of year again in Junior Rugby and considering what we have all had to endure, we are delighted to report on a number of aspects of financial management within the Brisbane Junior Rugby Union Inc (BJRU); and the guiding recommendations and suggestions of the Auditor.

2023 has been characterised as the fourth year of the BJRU in transition - from organisational dependency (relying largely for its directions and operations on the QRU) to independency of governance and operations of its business. This effectively has meant that the BJRU has for the first time in several years conducted administration of all of its age level competitions; and has governed in its own right.

The changes have also created many challenges, and these are again reflected in the President's Report. The financial cost of these operations has been high as has been the cost of establishing a more efficient administrative/operational unit now called the Secretariat. The latter is currently staffed with 2 full-time senior personnel and one casual which have worked diligently in running operations but also in exploring new ways of implementing more innovative strategies to cut costs.

Never-the-less, these kinds of changes have created challenges which have incurred reasonable but some increases in costs. To minimise any increases in costs, the Board has adopted the two business principles of "full cost recovery" and "user-pay".

The Auditor (Carthills) has now completed the 2023 Audit and I can report the Association's commercial position is 'stable'. This may be seen in the Auditor's Report for the financial year.

The Auditor's Report also demonstrates that the Association has not strictly followed its own financial principles listed above; namely, that costs exceed income for the 2022-2023 year. The Auditor therefore queried the sustainability of the organisation and remediation strategies, including but not limited to an increase in income through an increase in the participation levy for 2024. A similar increase was recommended in the 2019 Audit but not adopted after consultation with the Association's Member Clubs.

After lengthy discussions at Board level, it was proposed that the player participation fee would need to increase from \$65.00 to \$75.00 for the 2024 season to cover some of the rising costs incurred due to wages and general running costs.

As BJRU Board continues to work hard at identifying options and opportunities to increase our revenue streams and not rely solely on player levies. The outgoing Board strongly recommends that the area of marketing and business development, underpinned by one of its three strategic goals, namely improved communication, and connections with Member Clubs, be a major focus for 2024.

Based on the above considerations, I can confirm that Brisbane Junior Rugby Union Inc. is moving forward from the financial year ending 30th September 2023, and is in a stable financial position for the 2024 season.

I wish all the Clubs the best for the 2024 season.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981. The Committee has determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1981, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards ASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1031: Materiality and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

Income Tax

Income derived by the Association is exempt from the payment of income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are carried at cost less, where appropriate, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use. The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying values of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised in the Income and Expenditure Statement.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks and other shortterm highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

Trade and Other Receivables

Trade and other receivables include amounts due from members. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any discounts/rebates allowed.

When the association receives operating grant revenue, donations or bequests, it assess whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15. When both these conditions are satisfied, the association identifies each performance obligation — recognises a contract liability for its obligations and recognises revenue as it satisfied its performance obligations. Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the association recognises the asset received in accordance with recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards,

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised when control of the products has transferred to the customer.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

Trade and Other Payables

Trade and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain outstanding, The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and the outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the association commits itself to either the purchase or the sale of the asset (i.e. trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables, initially measured at the transaction price) are initially measured at fair value, plus transaction costs. Financial assets are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2023

Financial Assets (Cont/...)

A financial asset is derecognised when the holder's contractual rights to its cash flows expires, or the asset is transferred in such a way that all the risks and rewards of ownership are subsequently transferred. On derecognition, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable is recognised in profit or loss.

The association recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets that are measured at amortised cost.

Related Party Transactions

The Association incurred costs totalling \$21,595 from Lisa Miller, the spouse of a Committee Member, in relation to administration services provided for the year ended 30 September 2023.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF BRISBANE JUNIOR RUGBY UNION INC.

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Brisbane Junior Rugby Union Inc. (the Association), which comprises the Balance Sheet as at 30 September 2023, the Income and Expenditure Statement for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information and the Statement by Members of the Committee.

In our opinion, except for the effect of the matters described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion paragraph, the financial report of Brisbane Junior Rugby Union Inc. presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Brisbane Junior Rugby Union Inc. as at 30 September 2023 and of its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, and the Associations Incorporation Act 1981.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those Standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Profession and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110: Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The following gives rise to our qualified opinion:

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practicable for the Association to maintain an effective system of internal control over receipts for income until their deposit into the Association's bank account. Accordingly, our audit in relation to income was limited to amounts actually banked.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the Association to meet the requirements of the Associations incorporation Act 1981. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Committee for the Financial Report

The committee of the Association is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report, and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The committee's responsibility also includes such internal control as the committee determines is necessary to enable the preparation and fair presentation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

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In preparing the financial report, the committee is responsible for assessing the Association's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters relating to the going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the committee either intends to liquidate the Association or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Report

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial report as a whole is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of this financial report.

As part of an audit in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

 Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

 Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Association's internal control.

 Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the committee.

Conclude on the appropriateness of the committee's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to the events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Association's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Association to cease to continue as a going concern.

COMPETITION MANAGER'S REPORT

Our 2023 season kick started with a very successful Junior Colts Lightning Series season. Our teams increased from 10 teams in 2022 to 16 teams in 2023. Included in these teams are Sts Peters, Kings College, Helensvale Hogs, PBC Allegators and Surfers Paradise. For the first time our players that got selected in the Dream Team were given the opportunity to play against the Reds Possibles vs Probables Teams in a three-way to be viewed for selection into the final u18 teams to represent the Reds Academy. Four of our players were selected into the final teams representing the Reds.

Our Skills Development Rounds for the Players in u10-u16 were completed this year with no external influences (i.e., floods or Covid), which was great for the players. We also managed to have a normal finals season with 3 rounds of finals.

The u12 Simon Abubakar Carnival was again a successful event with heaps of talent on display and we hosted our 2nd successful Vending 1st Challenge Cup with 7 teams participating (Darling Downs, Far North Coast, Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast Stingrays, Victoria Brisbane Navy and Red). Both our teams made it to the Semi-Final rounds with Brisbane Navy winning the Challenge Cup.

We changed our representative selection process for u13, u14 and u16 boys to give all players a chance to be viewed for selection by having 1) a skills round that was club nominated, 2) 'magic' round where all teams play at the same venue and then having 3) possibles vs probables (made up with players viewed in round 1 and 2) for a final selection of 1 team per age group to represent BJRU. Our u16s travelled to NSW and our u13 and u14 respectively participated in new interstate carnivals in the June / July holiday with both teams being victorious. Our u13 and u14 representative teams also played against Country in the City vs Country clash and both teams won their respective games.

Our Girls XVs development program (Gem Series) in Term 2 kicked off with success and we also trialed longer 9 round competitions with finals for all the age groups and we also trialed ODD (u11, u13, u15, u17) age groups in 2023 vs the EVEN (u12, u14, u16, u18) age groups in 2022. Our Girls 7s again was a huge favourite amongst the girls and ran over 6 weeks (10 rounds and finals) and we will look into extending this for 2024. The Girls XVs representative teams (u14, u16 and u18) travelled to VIC, where the u14s won the Championship. Our u14s and u16s XVs Girls Representative Teams also played against Country in the City vs Country clash. Our 7s Girls (u15s and u17s) participated in the Girls 7s State Championships. Both our Girls teams made the Semi-Finals and the u17s were champions.

GROWTH

2023 player numbers for the 15 a side has shown a decrease from last year. The BJRU had an overall decrease of (-5.1%) in player numbers in the traditional (u6-u18 winter competition), with a loss of 357 players.

This does not take into consideration the Little Rugby programs (3-5 year olds) participants of 623 (2022: 529) at 17 of our clubs or the 63 Modified Rugby Players or the 481 female players registered to our clubs, playing in the Girls 12s, XVs and 7s competitions. These expanded programs provide an ever-changing picture of how participants are choosing to experience rugby in much greater variation than just the traditional form of the game. Rugby is becoming more inclusive with different formats of the game, and it is certainly a game for all. Gathering all of these registered participants indicates 8071 participants in some form of junior rugby offered by our clubs in 2023.

This year's winter competition generated more teams than 2022 – 451 Brisbane Club Teams – 220 Saturday Teams (2022:225, 2021: 237, 2020:221) and 231 Sunday Teams (2022:224, 2021:212, 2020:206), with a total of 6644 registered players as compared to the 7001 actual winter competition players in 2022 (2021:6734, 2020:6346). We had more teams participating, but with a decrease in player numbers which shows a number of teams didn't have a full team squad.

The U7 (+6), U8 (+2), U11 (+4), U13 (+6), U14 (+3), U16 (+5), Jnr Colts (+6) – showed an increase in teams respectively in each age group. U6 (-6), U9 (-7), U10 (-6), U12 (-7) and U15 (-2) showed as a loss of teams.

Our greatest player age groups were in the u16 (+40), u7 (+38) and u11 (+21). Our most significant player loss was in u9 (-90), u6 (-89), u12 (-85), u10 (-83), u15 (-65), u14 (-45). Having run for the last couple of years since Covid with greater player loss through most of our age groups, the fact that players have returned in our younger (u7) and older age groups (u16) is a positive sign. The loss of players in our u9, u10, u12-u15 is huge and might impact our Sunday teams.

RETENTION

Reviewing player retention from the previous year, tells us that our retention of players dropped in most of our age groups. It still sits as high as 102.78% for u9 and then dips to 87.37% for u12. Our biggest decrease was our u15s that decreased from 93.9% in 2022 to 77.4% in 2023. Our u17/u18s increased to 100.85% (2022:98.78% 2021: 78.32%) which is great for rugby as that means the players are coming back to play club rugby and hopefully, we can retain them in the game going forward to seniors.

The continued expansion across clubs of the Tots/Little Rugby Development groups for U3 – U5s, and new club offerings of Get Into Rugby, and Touch 7s have been introduced throughout Brisbane Clubs and have shown another avenue for families and communities to get involved in the sport of rugby, even if it is not in the traditional format we are used to.

We are in discussion with RA to implement different rules for u6-u7 to improve the development of rugby, making it more fun and looking at improving the little players skills going forward into u8s.

Our Junior u6-u9s moved away from playing hubs in 2023 and went back to Home and Away games before Covid. We also moved out of the normal regional groupings. A survey will be going out to all clubs shortly as we had mixed feedback to see how we can grow and improve our u6-u9 competition and also getting at least half a season's games out in advance.

Our girl's rugby space continues to grow and develop, but we will be looking at implementing a few changes to better this space.

It is imperative that we continue to be proactive in reviewing our offerings and formats to ensure that rugby continues to move forward and offer its participants a product they want to play. The continual review of the competition and its components enables the opportunity for the BJRU to recognize areas in which the game can be improved and adapted to suit an ever-changing marketplace.

Whilst we continue to work and develop new ways to increase participation and community involvement, we must be reminded that governance structures are in place to ensure the safety, consistency and quality of the sport. The rugby community needs to ensure that they and their members are continually educated about the policy changes that are presented and the basic reasons why children play the code we love.

Congratulations to those that are working together as an integral part for the establishment of development programs, combined sides, and shared facilities to ensure that no child misses out on an opportunity to participate in our code.

It was again exciting to see in 2023 more clubs working together to provide "barbarian teams" opportunities to get players on the field. This has worked very well in the girls' space, and we can now see it starting to solidify in the boys' competition space also. As we move forward and start to deal with the decreased numbers in player ranks, it is more important than ever for clubs to work collaboratively to provide well thought out and considered preparation to the inevitable occurrence of "not enough" or "too many" players to form sustainable teams.





2023 has been a year of continued building at the Albany Creek Brumbies. After the opening in 2020 of the new clubhouse, and now a couple of full seasons of rugby having been played, we are turning our minds as to what we need to do to help build the game not just for our club but across the north side region as a whole.

During 2023 we again hosted a variety of events including the Ballymore Cup in April, the Under 12 Simon Abubakar Carnival in June, the BJRU Grand Finals, QES 9/11 Memorial Day, the Santos All Schools 7's tournament in October and finished the season off with the Pacific Youth Festival. This last carnival alone saw close to 1,100 players and over 3,000 spectators attend each day. We were also extremely privileged to host a number of the Oceania 7s international teams as they trained in preparation for the Ballymore based competition. We look forward to providing similar support to BJRU, Queensland Rugby and other event organisers into 2024.

Our numbers of players this year was consistent with what might be considered a 'rebuild' taking place. A total of 180 boys and girls playing in our junior club. We again worked with Pine Rivers PUMAS in accepting registrations to ensure players could take to the fields across a couple of age groups. We acknowledge and appreciate their willingness to work together to find solutions to ensure as many players as possible can continue to play rugby – ultimately what we are here for. We were not able to field teams in the Under 10 & 11 age groups and this will be a major focus for us in 2024 to try and return these age groups to the club.

This year we continued to develop the Girls Rugby Academy at the Brumbies. Under the direction of our Vice President - Girls Rugby, Courtney West, a comprehensive girls rugby program was continued, and girls' rugby promoted within the local community and schools. The GRA was exceptionally successful enrolling 60 girls in the program run every Wednesday night throughout the season.

In addition to the continued success of the GRA the girls' teams played in the Under 11, 13, 15 and 17's competitions – thriving on the mixed program this year of 7's, 12 aside and Xv's version of the game. They all really enjoyed it and the girl's rugby skills and understanding of game management has continued to increase exponentially throughout the year. Girls' rugby is alive and well at the Creek and it is the intention to continue to build this component of the club, looking also for further opportunities to showcase the girls 15 aside game. 

In the year 2023, Souths Rugby Club witnessed significant achievements and milestones across various aspects of the organization. This report provides an overview of the key highlights and activities undertaken throughout the year.

Membership and Teams:

JNR Colts training kicked off our 2023 season starting on Sat 14th January. Muster night Friday 10th February began the rest of the Junior 2023 season. A total of 430 junior registrations, 58 registered coaches and managers, and 27 junior teams marked a strong start to the year.

The Junior Rugby Committee convened on Sunday, February 5th, for its first meeting, welcoming Dan Madden as the new U13 Age Coordinator.

A successful Junior Working Bee on the same day saw approximately 25 volunteers contribute to the maintenance and cleaning of the grounds and junior clubhouse.

Player Development and Training:

New jerseys were provided to all Junior teams in 2023, with a strategic plan to utilize them for the next five years.

Five successful coaching professional development sessions were organized in collaboration with BJRU, held at Souths Senior Rugby Club with a fantastic coaching attendance.

The club entered the JNR Colts competition from February 18th to March 16th, 2023, boasting a team of 24 players.

Club Growth & Development:

A targeted advertising campaign focused on players U10-U16 resulted in an increased 405 Junior registrations and 24 JNR Colt registrations, 35 modified rugby participants and 24 Mini Magpies by the end of the season.

Our Nev Frances Day, in recognition of one of the longest serving Junior presidents was held the first weekend of March.

We developed the pre-season competition starting at the end of February and hosted other clubs including Sunnybank, Easts, Wests, Redlands, Helensvale Hogs, and Wynnum over three weekends in preparation for our Rugby Season.

Special coaching sessions by Garrick Morgan, Tony Daley, Damian McInally, and Cullen Simpson, contributed to the Junior players' development from U8-U16s, cementing a greater synergy between the Juniors and Seniors.

Our 3-day Easter Junior clinic provided further opportunities for our Junior Magpie community to grow and develop as players.

The U10's & U11s had the opportunity of competing in the BJRU Development Carnival at Wynnum.

We created a JUNIOR referee contact list to aid and assist our U6-U9 junior teams in finding referees. Developing and encouraging our U14+ Junior players to gain their referee accreditation.
